Ealing Common Historic Walk

As part of the Annual Open House Weekend in September, the Ealing Common Society has a tradition of leading a walk around Ealing Common, exploring the Common's rich architecture and history.

On Saturday 17th September 2016, the walk attracted a crowd of over 20 people. Some were local Ealing residents, keen to know more about their Common, others came from further afield.

Blue Badge guide Roger Jarman led the walk, and Elaine Fraser showed the group round beautiful St. Matthew's Church. The walk ended at All Saints Church, built in honour of Spencer Perceval, the only British Prime Minister to be assassinated. The All Saints Archivist, Richard Bowden, talked about the church and its interesting history, and the group enjoyed tea and delicious homemade cakes, made by the parishioners.

Work Proceeding on the Common

Works have commenced on the Common. The drainage is being improved at the entrance to the Common on the Uxbridge Road, where vehicles enter for the fair and the circus. The ground here is frequently waterlogged and deeply rutted by the wheels of heavy vehicles. Works should ameliorate the situation with excess water being piped to a soakaway. Also, on the South Common the current meadow area is to be stripped of its surface layer of soil and seeded with a wildflower mix which will create a more attractive and diverse wild meadow area in the future.

Old Lavatory Block

The Council has planted roses, clematis and other climbing plants against the walls of the ugly toilet block on the corner of Leopold Road and the Uxbridge Road. Eventually the building will be covered in a plethora of beautiful flowers making the area more attractive.

More Bulbs

Following last year's most successful bulb planting in the gardens at Warwick Dene, courtesy of the Bubble Fund, we will be using the remaining money to plant further bulbs in the gaps! A photograph was taken when the daffodils bloomed this Spring, so we have a record of where more are needed. We also hope to add some extra bulbs to the small area of garden in front of the disused public lavatories on the Uxbridge Road.


Morus Londinium

We applied for and have been chosen to receive three "King James I" black mulberry saplings, which we will have in November in time for National Tree Week. These saplings will come from Morus Londinium. This is a project being carried out by the Conservation Foundation, supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund. It was prompted because mulberries rarely feature in tree surveys, possibly because most are in private gardens and therefore more difficult to find than street trees. The history of these trees is fascinating. Mulberries are the food source for silkworms, and King James I attempted to establish a silk industry in Britain in the seventeenth century, when many black mulberries were planted, although white mulberries are actually preferred by the silkworms. The National Plant Collection of mulberries is held in the grounds of Buckingham and Kensington Palaces. We hope to plant our mulberries in the gardens at Warwick Dene.
